

FOSTER CARE AND COMMERCIAL SEXUAL EXPLOITATION

According to the FBI, **more than 100,000** children in the U.S. find themselves being sold for sex.ⁱ These children are Commercially Sexually Exploited Children (CSEC). Youth in foster care have a higher likelihood of being exploited, with pimps preying on youth as young as 12.ⁱⁱ In Alameda County, California, **41% of 267 victims** in 2011-2012 were foster care children.ⁱⁱⁱ

Although the U.S. supports a victim-centered approach, currently many CSEC survivors are treated as criminals and charged with prostitution. The CSEC population is beginning to gain national attention with new legislation allowing child welfare agencies to identify, track, and serve victims to and prevent human trafficking within the U.S. child welfare population.

After years in foster care, I didn't think anyone would want to take care of me unless they were paid. So, when my pimp expected me to make money to support 'the family', it made sense to me.'"iv
